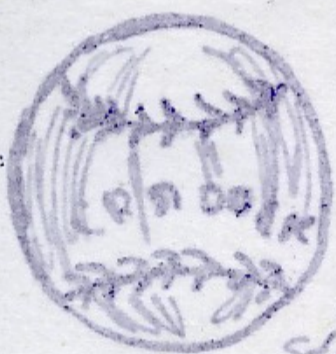

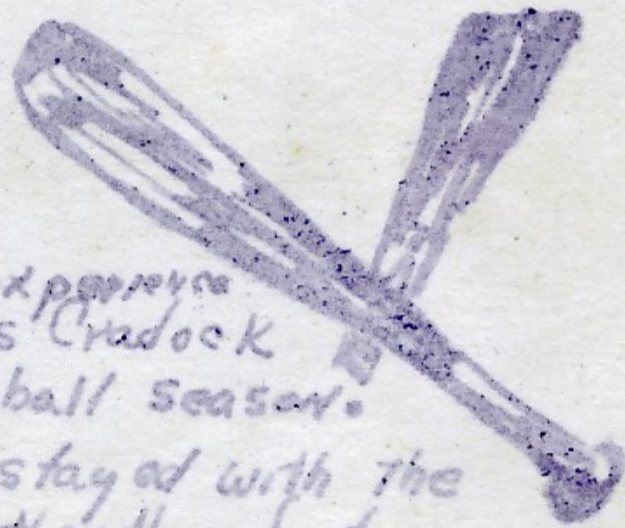

FOOTBALL

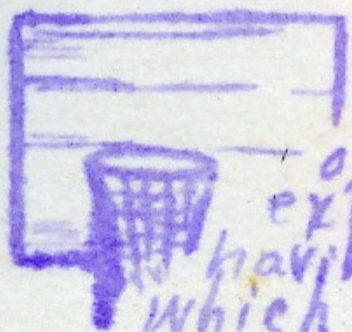

BASKETBALL




