



The Inter-Club Council has proved very successful for its first two years and we hope that it can continue serving the clubs in the years to come.








The Christoper's Hi-Y is a fellowship of high school boys who are devoted to a Christian purpose at work, in the home, school, and community.



We entered a float in the Homecoming Parade and sponsored a dance at the YMCA. We have also had several splash parties.


Our club consists of about 60 members and Mrs. Carolyn McGuire is our sponsor.




Art Club


Future Business Leaders




To obtain membership, each boy must be a momogram winner and be passed by the Athletic Board of the school. At present, we have 20 members.







Science Club




