Ohio State And Michigan Match Similar Offenses

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 18.—(P)—Ohio State and Michigan match strikingly similar offenses here tomorrow in a Big Ten football showdown.

The Buckeyes will throw a single wing offense against Michigan's duplicate with the Big Ten title and a possible Rose Bowl assignment in the balance.

A sell-out crowd of 97,239 will be on hand to see which team has the players to make the plans work.

With the return of Halfback Leo Koceski after a month's idleness because of four cracked ribs, Michigan has an extra-sharp weapon at the wingback spot. The same is true at left half, where Chuck Ortmann passes and runs, and fullback with plunging Don Dufek.

Ohio State has fought to a position of best offensive unit in the conference with a fast backfield built around the sophomore whiz, Vic Panowicz, and the passing talents of Pandel Savic.

Observers feel the two teams are about evenly matched on the ground. If this is the case, the emphasis will be on the aerial game where Ohio has a slight edge.

Hart Named For Maxwell Trophy

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 18.—(P)—If the Maxwell Memorial Football Trophy selections are any indication, the lineman is coming into his own.

Leon Joseph Hart, Notre Dame end who was named college player of the year by the Maxwell Club yesterday, is the second consecutive lineman chosen for the honor.

Chuck Bednarik, University of Pennsylvania center now playing with the Philadelphia Eagles in the National Football League, was selected last year. All the previous 11 Maxwell trophy winners were backs.

The Maxwell Club was formed in memory of Robert (Tiny) Maxwell, Philadelphia sportswriter killed in an automobile accident in the early 1920's.

Club President Bert Bell said there was little debate in the selection of Hart, a resident of Turtle Creek, Pa. Hart is expected to be presented January 10 at the club's annual dinner when the trophy will be presented.

Bell said Hart was "a greater player among great players on a Notre Dame team that some day may be classed as one of the top teams of all time."

The Irish co-captain is an all-around performer. He is the hub of the Notre Dame defense and a runner who could be used in the fullback slot. He is a vicious blocker and a glue-fingered pass receiver.

At the NFL's draft meeting last week, Hart was named the No. 1 choice of the Detroit Lions. He has indicated he may decide to play pro ball next season.

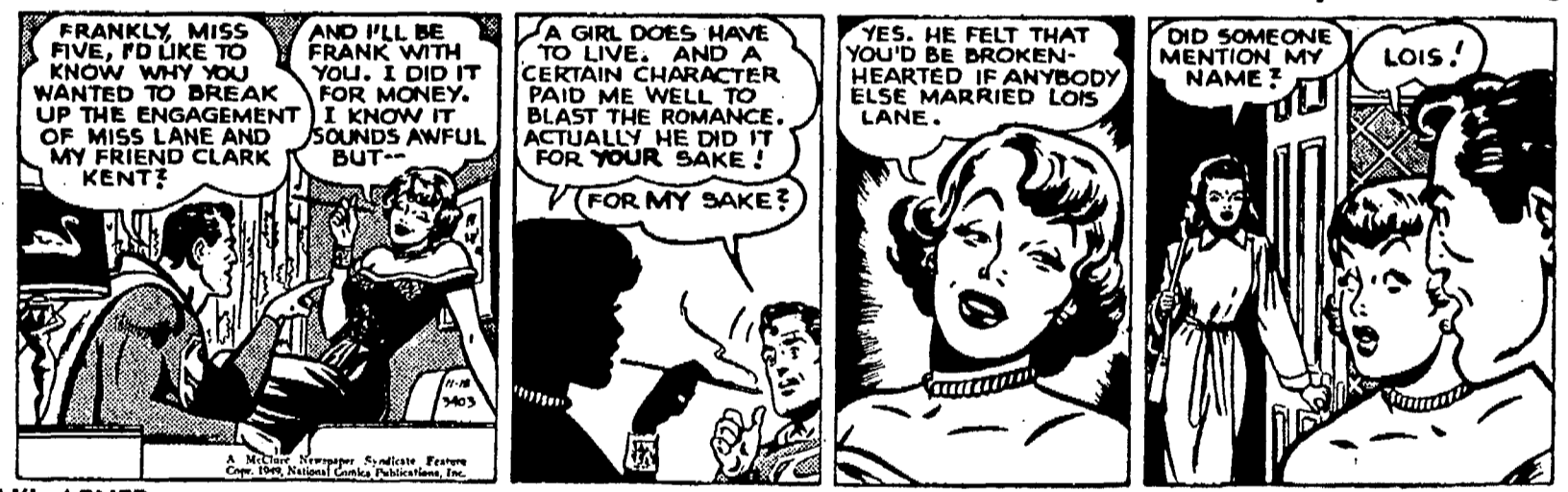

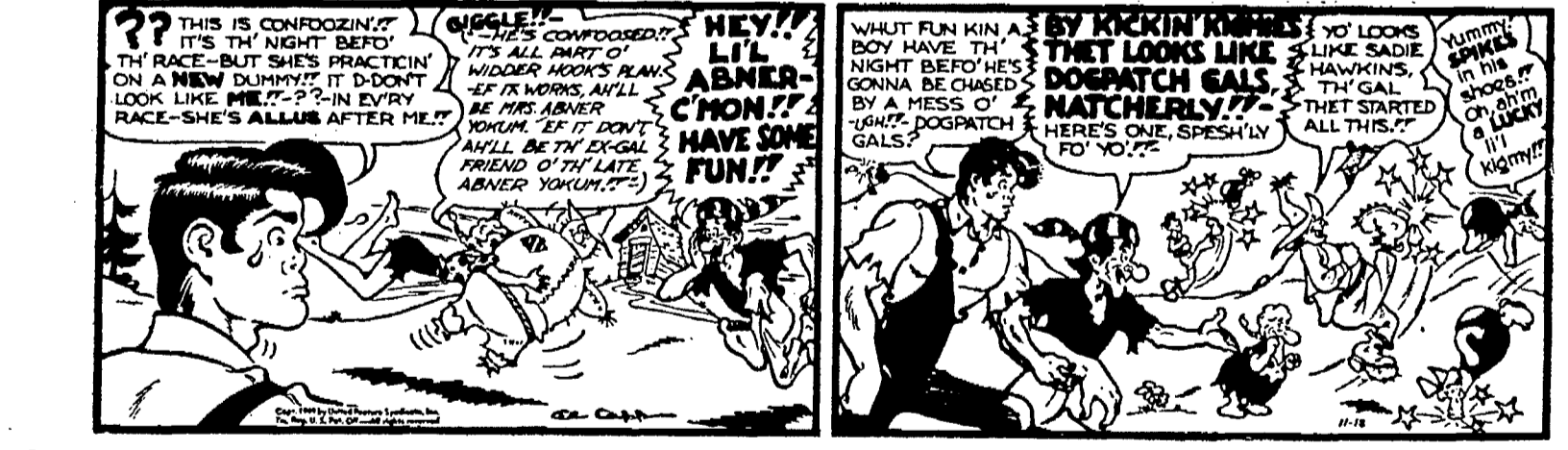

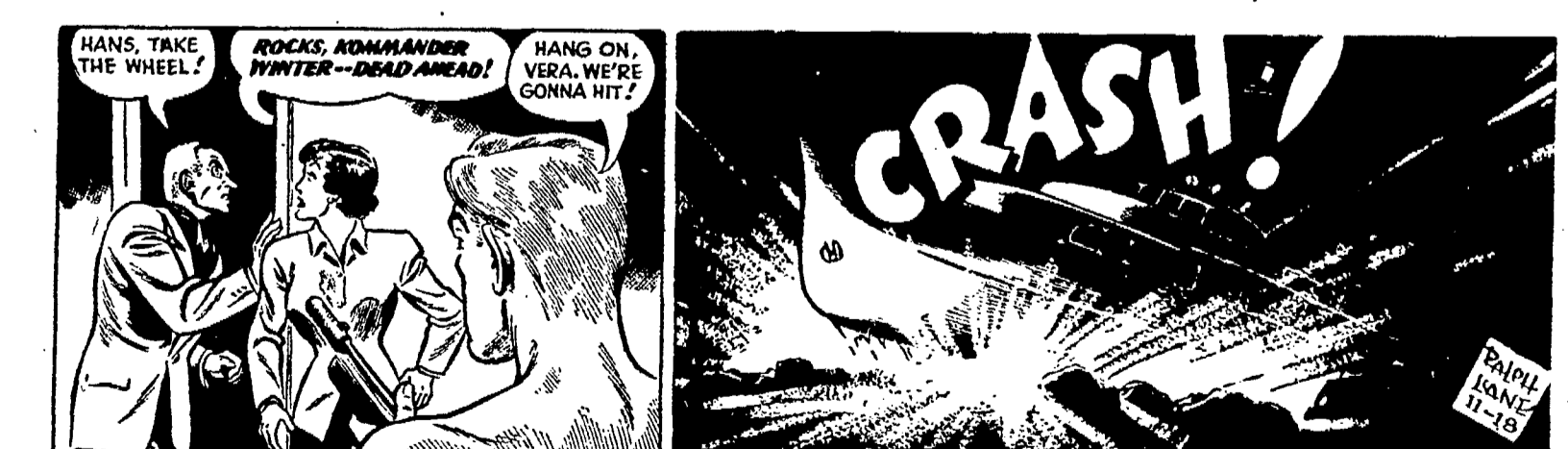
